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Focus and objectives

- Focus: How are adaptation policies developed and implemented in OECD countries (why OECD?)
- **Objectives:**
 - Provide an overview of national and selected sub-national adaptation governance approaches in 10 OFCD countries
 - Show how these approaches actually function in selected adaptation policies
 - Draw lessons from experiences with similar governance approaches that are applied in related policy fields (e.g. climate change mitigation and sustainable development)
 - Provide guidance on how to advance the governance of climate change adaptation, in particular in countries that are at early stages of establishing respective policy frameworks.
- Why is the governance perspective important? Adaptation efforts would be endangered if some governance challenges are not addressed adequately. So far, "the governance framework of adaption is still largely in the making (Paavola 2008)
- What are the governance challenges that need to be addressed by adaptation policies?







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(ii) Climate change adaptation efforts cut across levels of government	Better integrate policies vertically (across levels of government)	Inter-governmental coordination bodies, multi-level governance instruments such as treaties, agreements, guidelines, strategies between different levels of gov., etc.



(iv) Those affected most by climate change are often not well organised and therefore excluded from policy making	Facilitate 'procedural justice' through participation	Institutionalised stakeholder forums; ad-hoc participation (workshops/conferences/dialogues), online consultations, etc.

desk research and telephone survey

Country selection:


based on criteria-guided desk research and support from advisory panel

Overview of governance approaches and related policies at the national and regional level

Innovation:

First comparative overview of adaptation governance approaches





• Method:

2 case studies for 4-5 countries; desk research and 4 interviews per case

Case selection:


Significant adaptation policies from different levels of policy making, linked to the governance approaches described in WP1

• Expected results:

Get to know adaptation policies and better understand the relevance of governance approaches ("in how far did governance approaches shape adaptation policies?")

Innovation:

Relevance of governance approaches often unclear





Method:


Literature review, guided by case study findings

• Expected results:

Transfer knowlege on the governance of complex issues (in particular regarding success factors and obstacles); fill gaps in adaptation governance (research)

Innovation:

Bridge thematic divides and learn from relevant research in other areas
