A transition towards a participatory society? Exploring participation: strategies, challenges and solutions of participation in rural and urban Alternative Food Networks (AFN)

Background:

With growing global critique of the globalized, conventional, agricultural production and distribution system, local, grassroot "Alternative Food Networks" (AFN) have risen to redefine the agri-food value chain and meet the demands of stakeholders in providing local alternatives to produce, sell and consume food products.

AFNs have gained wide ranging interest in academia and society as promoters of an empowered and participatory society. Ranging in structure and purpose, AFN include but are not limited to Community Supported Agriculture (CSA), Food Cooperatives (Foodcoops), Participatory Guarantee Systems (PGS) and collective seed saving systems. They have implemented different approaches in reorganizing stages of the agri-food value chain, establishing food democracy, empowerment and stakeholder participation.

Participation has been a central aspect to the rise and fall of many such systems. As a concept dependent on intrinsic and extrinsic motivation, availability of time and resources, as well as cultural and group dynamics, participation is critical to the continuous upholding of these systems.

The ESRS2022 satellite event at BOKU aims to discuss the wide-ranging concept of participation within rural and urban AFNs.





Leading questions:

We invite researchers from around the world to contribute with their knowledge and expertise on successful or failed examples of participation in the agri-food value chain and discuss the following questions:

- Who are the stakeholders that participate in such Alternative Food Networks?
- Why do stakeholders participate?
- How do stakeholders participate and contribute?
- What are the benefits and challenges to participation?
- Why does non-participation occur?
- How does participation change over time?
- What can insights/experiences on participation teach us about reshaping our food system?
- How do Alternative Food Networks perceive, promote and/or hinder participation and nonparticipation?

Submissions from scientists that address, but are not limited to, this discussion are welcome.
