

Mobility English Language Courses for Academic Staff
National University of Ireland, Galway





Academic Programme Overview – *Mobility Courses*

This course combines general English development with language practice and consolidation specifically for the area of teaching and research at higher education institutes. Participants will have the opportunity to use English for oral communication, reading and listening as well as writing in genres related to their own academic disciplines.

English language learning activities take place in an open, supportive environment, and include vocabulary building and practice, describing and role-playing real-life situations such as dealing with students, dealing with misunderstandings, negotiating and providing feedback.

The course also provides participants with a working introduction to Content and Language Integrated Learning for teaching discipline subjects with English-mediated instruction (EMI).

Academic Programme Aim

Participants will also have opportunities to experience and learn about Irish culture.

This course will combine General English development tasks with elements of Administration vocabulary development and use. Additionally, students will also get the opportunity to learn about elements of Irish Culture. Activities include describing and evaluating skills, using expressions to describe categories of things, dealing with misunderstandings, describing experiences of problem solving, carrying out an interview and describing disagreements and compromise.


