The university had a dedicated international office that provided academic support, advice on course selection, and assistance with any academic challenges I faced. Professors were also readily available during office hours to answer questions and provide guidance.

In summary, my Erasmus experience at Humboldt University of Berlin was enriching and fulfilling. Berlin's vibrant atmosphere, combined with the university's academic excellence, made it a perfect destination for my studies.
