Research Report

(Brief report of stay abroad from scientific point of view, ca. 1 page)

In my two weeks in Sweden, I was able to conduct my research in different city/towns to collect data for my PhD project: constructivist understanding of land use conflicts between economic activities, see details below:

I conducted focus group discussions and interviews with relevant stakeholders (e.g. indigenous people, forest owners, local people, city council representatives and researchers) regarding land use conflict and what do they think about the current development of the industries in Gällivare, Sweden – as the city is undergoing social transformation wherein a town is being moved to another place because the mine is expanding. Aside from the mining companies, there are also reindeer herders that have usufructuary rights to use the land, and forest owners who own the land. Tourism is also increasing as the Arctic is becoming more accessible and the 'last chance' tourism is becoming more popular. Additionally, green transition agenda is being pushed by the Swedish state thereby intensifying the land use conflict not only in Gällivare but also in Northern Sweden. This means, increased mining operation to produce minerals for development of more solar panels, green batteries, etc.; more Sami lands to be transformed to windfarms; and more forest harvesting for renewable energy and wood construction.

Initial impressions from the data collection conducted were: (1) there is cumulative impact of the industries on Sami lands and local community. (2) Industries and authorities are aware of the cumulative impacts and tries to resolve the conflict through a solution-oriented lens, up to the point that they have little acknowledgement of the presence of conflict. (3) Indigenous people, forest owners, residents and minority groups felt that their voices aren't heard in existing procedures, for example on decision making with regards to the development of their lands and use of resources.

The next step for this project is data analysis and result interpretation that is planned to be done together with SLU partners and LTU researchers. We also plan to include the local stakeholders and our participants in the result interpretation to make sure that their perspectives are included and to make the result really representative of the current discourses in the area. We also plan to disseminate the results with more actors, such as presenting the initial results to scientific conferences and creating a video clip regarding the results so as to inform the general public about the current issues in the Arctic and to make them understand that the arctic is not a empty wilderness but a place where humans and industries exist.
