The Open Access publishing fund is managed via the university library. Funding is provided for publications in peer-reviewed, high quality Open Access journals (List of open access journals http://www.doaj.org). The allocation of financial support is subject to specific guidelines. The funding of the publication costs by the library is only intended for publications of active members of the BOKU that are not covered by funded projects (FWF, FFG, etc.). The guidelines for receiving publication fees can be found on the library's Open Access website.

What is Open Access?

Open Access means the unrestricted and free access to scientific publications for anyone in the world using an internet connection.

In June 2015 a BOKU Open Access strategy was signed by the rectorate. BOKU is a signatory of the Berlin Declaration on Open Access to Knowledge in the Sciences and Humanities. Therefore the University recommends their researchers to publish their scientific output in Open Access journals or Open Access repositories.

Benefits of Open Access

- Worldwide immediate and free access to scholarly publications and higher citation rates
- Increased visibility of the scientific output of researchers at the BOKU
- Authors retain their exploitation rights
- Fascilitated scientific knowledge exchange
- Free-of-charge access to scholarly information for the interested public

Open Access Publishing

There are two established variants of Open Access publishing:

The **Green Road to Open Access** refers to the self-archiving of pre-prints or post-prints of scientific articles in an institutional or subject-specific Open Access repository (e.g. Boku:epub, bioRxiv or arXiv). (Directory of Open Access Repositories http://v2.sherpa.ac.uk/opendoar/)

In this context one speaks of the secondary publication of a published publication. The protection of the right for secondary publication has to be considered by the author when signing a publishing contract.

The **Gold Road to Open Access** refers to the publication of scientific articles in peer-reviewed, high quality Open Access journals (List of Open Access journals http://www.doaj.org).

In the context of memberships with Open Access publishers (BioMed Central) or special publishing agreements (Springer, Wiley, IWA Publishing, ACS, Elsevier, Taylor&Francis) the article processing charges (APC) are entirely funded by the library.

Open Access at the BOKU

BOKU:epub

BOKU:ePub is an Open Access platform for electronic publications and digitalised media. Uploaded scientific publications and theses by BOKU staff and students are available online and accessible for anyone in the world for free. Previously published articles can be uploaded as a copy to BOKU:epub as long as the exploitation rights have been clarified with the publisher. Publishing conditions for self-archiving and possible embargo deadlines of the selected journal can be found on the website

(http://www.sherpa.ac.uk/romeo/index.php).

Open Access funding: Transformative Agreements

For Open Access publications at <u>Springer</u>, <u>Wiley</u>, <u>IWA Publishing</u>, <u>ACS</u>, <u>Elsevier</u>, <u>Taylor&Francis</u> and the Open Access platform <u>BioMed Central</u>, the costs are entirely covered by the library. A discount on publication costs are granted for <u>MDPI</u> and <u>AAAS</u>. The funding of APC by the library generally applies to Corresponding Authors who are active members of the BOKU with a current employment relationship at the date of submission.
