## **Introduction & Programme**

What do food, feed, materials, energy and people have in common? They are all strongly connected through economic systems while also being part of the earth's ecosystems, a closed system where all resources are only available to a limited extent, with the exception of solar energy. Ecosystems have evolved over time to optimise energy flows and matter recycles, ensuring an internal balance. However, humans are currently disrupting this balance, causing major consequences for the environment. Indeed, the unconstrained resource consumption of our society, driven by its associated values and economic principles, is directly related to a cascade of various environmental drawbacks which generate irreversibly changes to our planet. How life on Earth will look in the future holds even more significant importance for young generations, as it directly shapes the world they will

inherit. Ensuring a liveable planet for future generations necessitates a collective commitment to minimising environmental damage and optimising resource consumption, aligning our actions with the principles of sustainable ecosystems. Considering that bioeconomy focuses on how Earth's limited resources can be efficiently and fairly used based on the principles of nature and societal involvement, it is precisely this challenge that will be addressed as part of the *BCF2024 – Vienna*.

In recent decades, youth have proven to be pivotal stakeholders in our society, advocating for a sustainable and fair future. Nonetheless, their significant role is still frequently downplayed in policy-making arenas, where they often become victims of tokenism. To effectively shape what lies ahead of them, it is crucial for them to unite their efforts, creating synergies that amplify their collective impact. However, this collaborative approach might not yield the desired political influence if not grounded in scientific knowledge, which would reinforce the validity of their perspectives and lend credibility to their advocacy efforts. Amidst the urgent calls for action, *BCF2024 – Vienna* emerges as a catalyst aimed at empowering youth to become bioeconomy changemakers. This one-day workshop is dedicated to fostering cross-sectorial collaborations and sharing evidence-based knowledge with young participants, presenting the transformative potential of bioeconomy. *BCF2024 – Vienna* seeks to equip the youth with insights into how bioeconomy can effectively address contemporary challenges.

Starting with an exploration of individual interpretations of good life standards and resource use, the workshop will delve into strategies for securing these "good standards" for future generations. The event will not only challenge participants' perspectives but also harness their innovative young spirit, and highlight their ability to bring innovative ideas and unique perspectives, essential for involving the broader society in these pursuits. With their exceptional communication skills, youth are seen as crucial agents for crafting diverse and tailored communication strategies, which have the power to engage society and guide it towards positive change. Additionally, by inspiring youth organisations that are part of established organisations and wider international networks, the *BCF2024 – Vienna* will serve as an inspiring beacon, pushing the transformation towards a holistic bioeconomy forward within Austria and, consequently, on the European level by direct influence.



#### **Target Groups**

In the last decades, youth organisations have proved to be catalysts towards a more sustainable future and pivotal drivers of our society thanks to their potential political pressure and consequent influence on policy-making processes. However, to maximise their impact, it is crucial for them to merge their efforts and bring together their different perspectives.

On the one hand, the event aims to uncover synergies for cross-sectorial collaborations and, on the other, educate young participants about the bioeconomy as one of the solutions to societal, economic and environmental challenges.

Specifically, to achieve these goals, the *BCF2024 – Vienna* will bring together 40 representatives from youth organisations active in the bioeconomy and related fields, such as industry, policy, forestry, agriculture, or environmental-related groups. The event will focus mainly on Austrian organisations or Austrian chapters of international organisations. By inspiring youth organisations part of wider international networks, the event will serve as an inspiring beacon, motivating these umbrella youth networks to replicate its success at the European, pushing the transformation towards a holistic bioeconomy forward within Austria and, consequently, on the European level by direct influence.

#### **Inclusivity and Sustainability**

The integration of people with disabilities or illnesses, as well as of people from different societal and economic backgrounds, striving towards gender balance, is of utmost importance to BOKU. Similarly, as BOKU is committed to reaching sustainability in all areas of its work, including in the interaction between BOKU and society, the *BCF2024 – Vienna* will be organised according to sustainability criteria (e.g., the Austrian Ecolabel for Green Meetings and Green Events and/or the ÖkoEvent certification).

### The BCF2024

The *BCF2024* is an event organised by the DC RTD of the European Commission, in collaboration with the *EU Bioeconomy Youth Ambassadors*. It aims to engage youth as drivers of the transformative change required in view of the multiple challenges the EU is facing nowadays and to unlock the full potential of the bioeconomy. The festival will improve the connection between youth and bioeconomy innovation ecosystems while empowering youth to act as catalysts towards the circular and sustainable use of biological resources.

The festival will take place between 11. and 17.03.2024 in various locations across the EU, with a high-level main event organised by the European Commission in Brussels on 13 and 14 March 2024. A limited number of satellite events will be organised by interested parties in different European locations, among them the *BCF2024 – Vienna*.
